Introduction:

On behalf of all members of the Eaton Rapids Police Department, I am proud to present the 2024 Eaton Rapids Police Department Annual Report.

2024 was certainly one of the most challenging of the ten years I have served this community as Chief of Police. However, I'm pleased to report the challenges we faced were not due to the type or frequency of crimes that occurred in our city. In fact, we saw declines in the number of non-aggravated assaults, larcenies and traffic crashes that were reported to ERPD.

The challenges that presented themselves in 2024 were due to issues of staffing within the police department. As you are aware, staffing has been a challenge these past few years for ERPD and law enforcement agencies across the nation. However, this issue became critical for ERPD because of resignations in late 2023 and into early 2024, when our road patrol consisted of Lt Creger, Officer Briscoe, Officer Platte, and me for the road patrol until Officer Reynolds completed his field training in the spring. The staffing shortage forced ERPD to move to a 6:30 A.M.-230 A.M schedule for several months, and even maintaining that coverage was very difficult due to the lack of available officers. As Chief I am grateful for the officers who worked overtime and adjusted their schedules as needed to continue to provide quality police services to the citizens of Eaton Rapids.

Fortunately the staffing situation improved as the year went on, and in July 2024 ERPD was able to return to providing road patrol and police response 24 hours a day in July. ERPD was also able to hire an additional cadet late this year. This cadet began the police academy in January 2025, and his hiring brings us to ten and half positions, which and has generated a great deal of excitement (and relief) among the staff heading into the new year.

This report is intended to present you with overview of department activity during the 2024 calendar year. It includes statistics, notable investigations, equipment and staff training information, along with other information designed to give you a clear picture of the activities of ERPD in 2024.

Once again, I want to emphasize the work, commitment, and professionalism of the officers of the Eaton Rapids Police Department who successfully navigated the staffing challenges while serving our community. I am incredibly proud of them, and look forward to a future of growth and development for all of us at ERPD.

Personnel and Equipment

Personnel

Eaton Rapids Police Department is currently staffed with ten and half police officers, consisting of the Chief, one Lieutenant, one Detective, one School Resource officer and seven patrol officers. The School Resource Officer is a seasonal position funded by Eaton Rapids Public Schools. We also have one full-time Administrative Assistant. As was explained in the introduction, ERPD struggled in 2024 with adequate staffing, but by the end of the year all open positions were filled. Like many agencies, ERPD has struggled with hiring and retaining officers for the last several years. ERPD only had one resignation during 2024, and the officer who resigned left for a larger agency with better retirement benefits than we currently offer. When presenting ERPD as a potential employer I focus on selling the competitive pay and benefits that are offered along with our positive and supportive work atmosphere. The strong community support our department receives also plays a significant role in making the staff feel appreciated and Eaton Rapids a desirable place to work. While there is little we as a department can do to address our agency size, we must continue to look for ways to further develop the resources available to retain the valuable officers and staff of ERPD.

In August Lieutenant Paul Creger completed eight years of service with the department. For those unfamiliar with the Lieutenant, he began working here in 2016 after retiring from the Lansing Police Department as a detective. Lt. Creger has been leading our accreditation program, and he also supervises the department's firearms training, field training and other training programs in addition to his general supervisory duties.

Administrative Assistance Kim Eddy has served the department for thirty years. She is often the initial point of contact for ERPD and handles a plethora of things, including the sex offender registry, firearm purchase permits, freedom of information act requests, agency invoices, and all issues regarding compliance with the Criminal Justice Information System security policies.

The officers here at ERPD are called upon to perform a variety of tasks to help support the agency. These include serving as defensive tactics instructor, crime scene investigator and a child safety seat inspector, just to name a few. The willingness of individual officers to volunteer to serve in these special duty capacities is crucial to providing our community with a full-service law enforcement agency. I have noted these additional duties in the department roster listed below. While staffing changes have reduced the number of specialized services, we are actively working with the new team to fill those roles.

Detective Ken Snyder, who is an experienced investigator, was hired in January of 2023 under a memorandum of understanding with the officers' union. His initial duties included reviewing several open cases, and some unsolved cases. Detective Snyder currently manages several of the more complex cases that are reported to ERPD while continuing to support and assist the patrol officers with their investigations. In addition to his investigative duties, Detective Snyder manages the department property and evidence room.

ERPD swore in three new officers in 2024. Officer Yutaka Benson was a licensed officer who had worked at the East Lansing Police Department. Michael Kipp was hired as a cadet in July and finished his police academy training in December. He is now a licensed officer in the ERPD Field Training program. Cadet Ryan Hayward was also hired in December and is currently attending the Lansing Community College Police Academy, with an expected May 2025 graduation date.

It is important to note that approximately \$20,000 of the academy costs for each cadet are covered by grants from the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards.

Equipment/Software

The Department currently has four marked patrol vehicles in its fleet. The marked units are all equipped with in-car camera, internal microphone, rifle mount, emergency traffic lighting, fire extinguisher, first aid kit, ceramic rifle armor and other assorted supplies. The first aid kits were updated in 2024 with new bags and more duty specific supplies. We took delivery of a black 2024 Ford Police Utility in 2024. We received several complaints about the black color instead of the gray we traditionally use. The graphics on car #22 were removed along with the overhead lights. The vehicle was rotated to administrative use. The 2013 Impala that we had was auctioned off. We will be looking to purchase a new patrol vehicle in 2025 to replace the 2019 vehicle in the patrol fleet and rotate that to administrative use.

The Ford Police Utilities work effectively for police patrol work. Their all-wheel drive is useful during Michigan winters and they provide valuable interior compartment space for the gear officers carry. Recent staffing shortages mean less miles driven, which saves the city money and extends the life of our existing fleet and saves the city money.

Several years ago the Eaton Rapids Police Department became the first agency in Mid-Michigan to purchase and deploy the Ford Utility Hybrid vehicles for law enforcement use. Since that time, we have received numerous inquiries about their operation and use in the field. Although they cost more than the standard gasoline model there is notable gas savings when the vehicle is operating in electric mode. Particularly during idle time. A study conducted by Off Briscoe assessed approximately \$3300.00 annual fuel savings resulting from the use of these vehicles.

The department currently owns ten 9mm Glock model 17 pistols that were purchased in 2019. We also have five 5.56 caliber patrol rifles, the most recent of which was purchased in 2022 to ensure that all uniformed, on duty personnel have access to a rifle. Two of the rifles purchased many years ago under an older military surplus program have been taken out of service and are to be sold once we can find a lawful buyer. ERPD also has three Tasers for use by officers on patrol.

Two of the more common software systems we use are PowerDMS and Talon Incident Management. PowerDMS is used for policy tracking, dissemination, and overall policy management. It's also critical to the accreditation process. For general reporting we use Talon Incident Management, operated by Core Technology. It's a simple but comprehensive reporting system. As part of our services with Core Technology the company stores and backs up all of our incident reports and incident photographs. It is also the program utilized to provide several of the statistical reports noted later in this report.

2025 Goals and Professional Development

Goals

In 2023, the Eaton Rapids Police Department applied for accreditation with the Michigan Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. As part of the process, Eaton Rapids City Council authorized the Chief to hire a consultant to assist with the development and overhaul of the department policies and procedures. We have worked alongside the Rossow Group for a year now and have made good progress. It is our goal to complete the process in late 2025 by having our onsite assessment by the commission representatives.

The Eaton Rapids Public Safety Building is more than twenty years old. There are aspects of the building such as heating and cooling, pedestrian doors and door handles, shower facilities and the parking lot that require maintenance or upgrades due to deterioration. As Chief I would like to work with City Council to determine future funding solutions to resolve these maintenance challenges.

We plan to initiate research into the implementation of a drone program for use with the department and possibly with other city departments. Drones have been used now in law enforcement for several years and have been a very effective tool. They can be deployed in cases of missing people, fleeing

suspects, traffic crashes and natural disasters. They can also be used as eyes in very dangerous situations in place of an officer. The Drone program can also be used as a recruiting and retention tool to provide opportunities for officers to expand their skills.

Lastly, we will look to successfully renew the collective bargaining agreement between the City of Eaton Rapids and the Capital City Labor Group (Union representing the officers), which expires in June 2025. It will be an important step, and will have a significant impact existing retention efforts.

Training and Professional Development

In 2024 the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards, with funding support from the Michigan legislature, implemented a pilot program for continuing professional education (CPE). Police agencies in Michigan are allotted \$1000 per full-time equivalent to train officers in pre-established categories. CPE requirements will be mandated in the future to maintain licensure as a police officer in the state. In 2024 officers were required to have twenty-four hours of training in categories generally falling under the topic of ethics in policing and interpersonal relations.

ERPD utilizes a variety of sources to provide the necessary level of quality and breadth of training necessary for our officers to perform at a high level of competency. One of the sources we utilize is an online training platform called Virtual Academy. The CPE requirements for 2024 were met by utilizing this service. We are also members of the Southern Michigan Criminal Justice Training Consortium. The Consortium is a collaborative partnership among approximately twenty-seven law enforcement agencies in southern Michigan. Through this partnership we share law enforcement distribution funds, instructors, and other resources to work collaboratively to present training that many of us could not do alone. As the CPE requirements grow more stringent that partnership will increase in value. The final, and quite possibly most important resource is our own staff. The ability of some of ERPD staff members to present advanced training to other members of ERPD is extremely valuable. Most notably, Officer Briscoe's background in defensive tactics and Lt. Creger's skills in firearms.

In addition to the twenty-four hours of CPE training, Officers trained in defensive tactics, firearms proficiency, active violence response, vehicle search techniques and speed measurement.

Some specialized areas of training received by ERPD members in 2024 included property room management, elected leaders conference, Freedom of Information Act processing, National Active Assailant Conference, Concerns of Police Survivors Health and Wellness Conference, and Field Training Officer certification.

Chief Weeks is a member of the Law Enforcement Action Forum. This is a group of law enforcement executives from around the state, selected by the cities insurance provider to review and implement recommended policies on behalf of the provider for their law enforcement customers. Twice a year, the group meets for two days to review policy and receive training on high liability areas.

Chief Weeks continues his participation in the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police and its training conferences. These conference assure continued up to date information on the ever training landscape of our profession.

INVESTIGATIONS, FLOCK CAMERAS AND STATISTICS

Statistics

In 2024, Eaton Rapids Police Department received 2044 calls for service and 1679 self-initiated activities were called into dispatch for a total of 3723.

Appendix A - Offense History Report. This report, generated by ERPD, reflects incidents that rise to the level of requiring a written report due to legal or procedural reasons between 2014 and 2024. The data from 2014 is inaccurate as ERPD was using a different reporting system at that time. There are a few areas to highlight in this report.

Excluding 2014, Non-Aggravated Assaults are at the lowest level in ten years. Aggravated assaults, although up from last year, are consistent with previous years' numbers.

You'll note changes in narcotics related charges in this section. The most notable change occurred in 2019 when recreational marijuana was legalized. In 2024 narcotic equipment violations were up over previous years. We have seen some increases in methamphetamine paraphernalia during patrol stops and an increase in THC vapes confiscated in the schools.

The noted decline in Obstruction of Justice is due to a change in procedure for how warrant arrests are categorized. Many of the arrests being made on warrants are now being categorized under general assist – other dept.

I am pleased to report the lowest number of on and off-street traffic crashes investigated by ERPD in the last ten years. This reduction is likely linked to the fact that ERPD officers made approximately three hundred more traffic stops in 2024 than the previous 10 year average, which shows the effectiveness of an increased emphasis on traffic safety by the department.

Investigations

Throughout the year ERPD investigated many notable crimes. I have selected a few to highlight here that display excellent investigative work, good partnerships, high level of complexity and the extensive geographic nature of some of today's criminals.

In December of 2024, a local business found a skimmer device on an ATM. The ongoing investigation has potentially linked the device to others placed throughout the country by a Romanian organized crime ring. The investigation is ongoing.

On April 23rd, 2024, an intoxicated driver drove their vehicle into the Grand River. Citizen Melanie Rasmussen grabbed a nearby boat and paddled with her hands out to the sinking vehicle and rescued the driver. An ERPD officer, along with Eaton Area EMS EMT Michael Flood, paddled out in a canoe and pulled Ms. Rasmussen and the driver to shore. Ms. Rasmussen was acknowledged by city council for her life saving action.

Officer Reynolds investigated an incident in which a teenage girl had a social media account hacked and was then coerced into providing sexual oriented images. The suspect was digitally tracked to a location out of state. Through our investigation ERPD contacted officials from out of state and learned the suspect was connected to other similar cases being handled by the United States Department of Homeland Security. ERPD's case was turned over to DHS for federal prosecution.

In January of 2024, Det Snyder and SRO Ferguson learned of a bomb threat made towards Eaton Rapids Public Schools. Through witness interviews and search warrants of one of the suspects cell devices, investigators were able to connect the information to two juvenile males. The case was turned over to Eaton County Prosecutors office and both were charged and processed in juvenile court.

In January of 2024, ERPD was alerted by the Norfolk Railroad Police that a subject in the city was in possession of stolen railroad signage and was attempting to sell it online. Officers surreptitiously set up an appointment to buy the stolen signs and were able to meet with the subject and recover the stolen signs. The seller was unaware the signs were stolen. The investigation and the signs were turned over to Norfolk Railroad police and later New York City Police as part of a broader multi-state investigation into sign stealing.

Flock Camera System

In 2024, ERPD worked with Flock Safety to install four Automatic License Plate Readers along the state routes in the city. Three were installed around the month of September. One remains uninstalled due to permit delays and now weather conditions. The cameras alert law enforcement to stolen vehicles, stolen license plates, missing persons and felony wanted persons connected to the vehicle. In addition, officers can search up to thirty days prior for data that can aid with active investigations.

From September 27th through December 31st of 2024 the license plate readers were utilized in approximately sixteen criminal investigations. ERPD personnel were alerted to and recovered three stolen vehicles due to the cameras. In each case the offenders were apprehended, and cases are pending prosecution. In another case, ERPD personnel utilized the camera system to identify a suspect vehicle

involved in a home invasion in Hamlin Twp for the Eaton County Sheriffs Office. The suspect was later apprehended and prosecuted. The cameras were also used in other cases to aid in identifying suspect vehicles and attempt to locate suspects both for ERPD and other agencies.

INTERNAL INVESTIGATIONS AND USE OF FORCE

Internal Investigations

It is the policy of the Eaton Rapids Police Department that all complaints of officer misconduct received shall be investigated. Maintaining the professional integrity of the department and the trust of the citizens of Eaton Rapids is of paramount importance. A periodic review of the complaints is conducted to assess training needs and as a tool to further educate and enact corrective measures as necessary. To assure compliance with policy, this synopsis will show the origin of the complaint and the outcome of the investigation as designated by policy terminology. Of note, the citizen complaints listed are those that rise to the level of a formal complaint. It does not include routine contacts that are quickly resolved without the need for a full investigation.

Due to changes in policy to comply with accreditation standards. There were two investigations into matters that previously would have been handled without this step. As a department we appreciate citizens coming forward with their concerns. No matter what the outcome of the investigation, these often are great opportunities to review how we deliver service and how we can improve our service to the community. This year all complaints brought by citizens were thoroughly investigated and were determined to be unfounded or the officer was exonerated. One of the complaints was made against an officer alleging a lack of courtesy and professionalism. Upon review of the body camera video, the officer endured incredible verbal attacks from the suspect and maintained his professionalism throughout.

Use of Force

The Eaton Rapids Police Department has a use of force policy that uses, as its foundation, the constitution, language recommended by our insurer, the Michigan Municipal League, federal case law and

accreditation standards. Per our policy, use of force by officers requires them to submit a separate use of force report. These reports are individually reviewed for policy compliance and potential areas of training focus or policy improvement, both individually and departmentally.

In 2024, there were thirteen incidents that rose to the level requiring a use of force report. This is a decrease from 15 in 2023. Four of these incidents involved felony charges and five involved misdemeanors. Three involved juveniles involved in school activities, and one involved a Persons Requiring Treatment (mental disorder).

Aside from minor scrapes and scratches, no significant injuries were noted from these incidents by the officers or the subjects involved. Also, no complaints were filed against ERPD officers stemming from these uses of force.

As in prior years, the actions of Eaton Rapids Police Officers continue to be professional, restrained, within department policy and in line with contemporary law enforcement standards.

COMMUNITY EVENTS OR NOTABLE ACTIVITIES

Lt. Creger, with the assistance of the Eaton County Activate Violence Team and many others, organized an Elected Leaders Conference in April of 2024. A program designed to inform regionally elected leaders about their roles and responsibilities leading up to and following a large active violence situation. There was significant positive feedback from city personnel and others that attended.

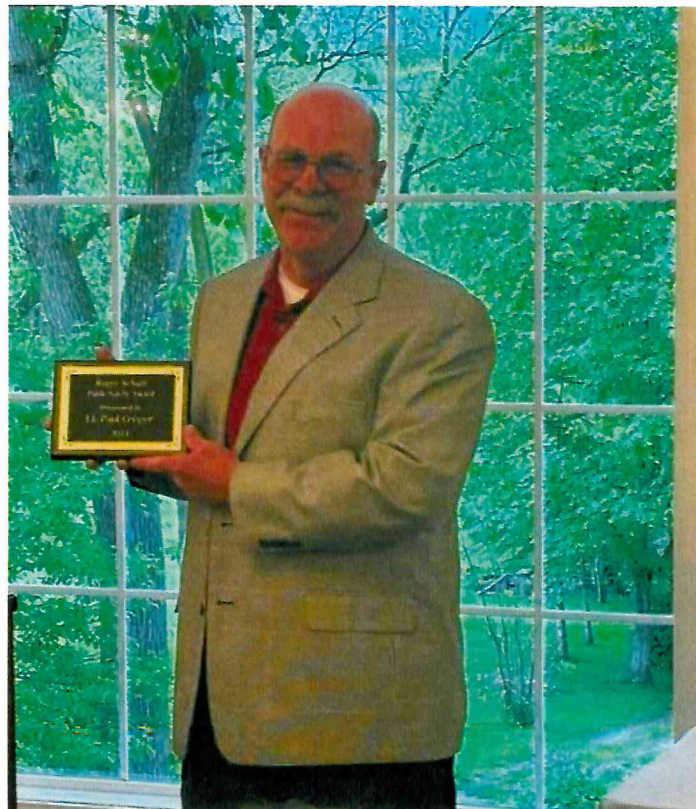

The primary objective of having a police presence in the schools is to protect life and property. The Eaton Rapids Police Department, through the SRO, is committed to protect the safety of the public and their rights to conduct lawful activities on school property.

The SRO is responsible for the prevention of crime as well as the appropriate application of law when unlawful actions or activities occur with students, staff, or visitors to the Eaton Rapids Public Schools. This effort is accomplished in direct collaboration with school building administrators on a daily basis.

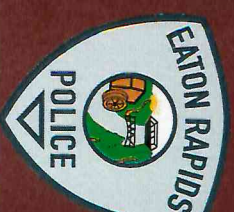
SRO Duties and Responsibilities



The SRO is also required to engage students as a mentor and be a resource for their education, development, behavior, and to help navigate challenging or difficult times in their day. While the SRO does not directly enforce school policies or rules, he or she is expected to cultivate relationships with students that build trust and create positive influences. This manner of interaction leads to mutually rewarding connections while promoting respect between students and law enforcement personnel.

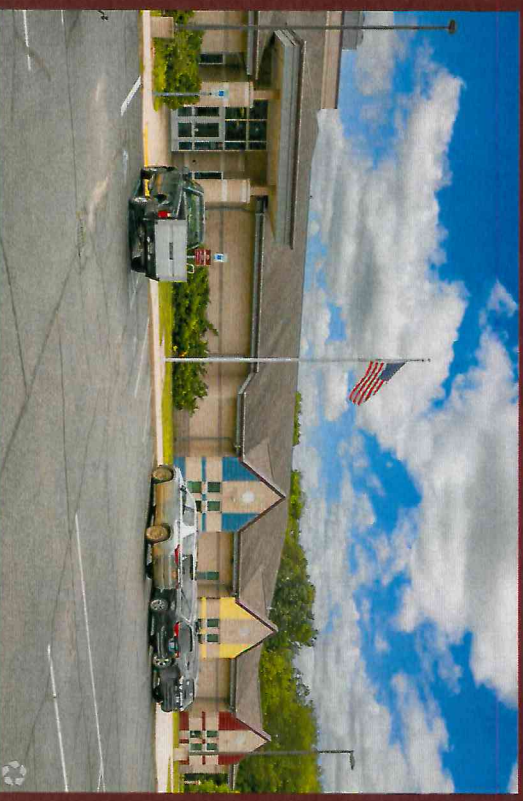
